Admission Requirements

Students at UTRGV are talented, compassionate, hard working, goal oriented and community minded. So when we look at applicants, we don't simply focus on grades and test scores. We take a holistic approach to admissions so we get a well-rounded picture of who each applicant is and how they would impact our campus community.

Entering Freshman

You are an entering freshman if you have graduated or will be graduating from a high school and have not attended a college/university AFTER your high school graduation. Even if you have earned college credit while you are STILL in high school you are considered an entering freshman. GED and home school students are also considered entering freshmen as long as they have not attended a college or university after receiving their diploma.

High school graduates in the top 10 percent of their graduating class receive assured admission to UTRGV. All UTRGV entering freshman applicants will have their own admissions profile created from all the information submitted, and admissions decisions will be based on that profile and their accomplishments in high school.

- ▶ Prior College Hours
- ▶ College Entrance Exams (SAT/ACT)
- ▶ Rigor of High School Courses Completed
- ▶ Leadership Experience

The College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP) assists students who are migratory or seasonal farmworkers (or children of such workers) enrolled in their first year of undergraduate studies at an Institution of Higher Education (IHE). The funding supports completion of the first year of university studies. Competitive five-year grants for CAMP projects are made to IHEs or to nonprofit private agencies that cooperate with such institutions. The program serves approximately 2,000 CAMP participants annually through 51 CAMPs across the nation at various universities.

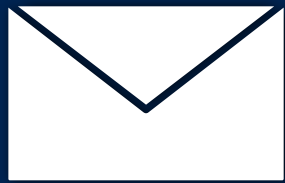

Application Essay

The essay is an opportunity to impress an admissions team that may be on the fence regarding your application. While much of the application review process is automated, the essay is an opportunity for students to be evaluated on their creativity and personal experiences.



Letters of Recommendation

Colleges often ask for 2 or 3 recommendation letters from people who know you well. These letters should be written by someone who can describe your skills, accomplishments and personality.

Colleges value recommendations because they:

- Reveal things about you that grades and test scores can't
- Provide personal opinions of your character
- Show who is willing to speak on your behalf

ABOUT DELL SCHOLARS AT UT AUSTIN

Beginning in the fall of 2023, qualifying first-year, Pell Grant-eligible students will become part of the Dell Scholars program. Dell Scholars at UT Austin will receive a \$20,000 scholarship over their time in college that can be applied toward their cost of attendance. Funds are available to scholarship recipients for up to six years to lessen loans and debt and are offered alongside the program's core support services. Qualifying students will be notified of their award with their initial financial aid package in March.

- Yale meets 100% of demonstrated financial need for all admitted students regardless of citizenship or immigration status. This includes undocumented students living in the US, with or without DACA status.
- More than 50% of Yale students receive need-based aid from Yale and 64% receive financial assistance from Yale or an outside source.
- Yale financial aid awards are based on the [total cost of attendance](#), which includes tuition, room, board, books, and personal expenses.
- Yale does not expect students to take out loans. Instead, Yale financial aid awards includes a Yale Scholarship, a parent contribution, and a small student contribution.
- The average Yale Scholarship was approximately \$52,800 for the 2018-2019 school year.
- Families whose total gross income is less than \$65,000 (with typical assets) are not expected to make a financial contribution towards their child's Yale education.
- Families earning between \$65,000 and \$200,000 (with typical assets) contribute a percentage of their yearly income towards their child's Yale education, on a sliding scale that begins at 1% and moves toward 20%.
- There is no income cutoff for financial aid awards. Some families with over \$200,000 in annual income receive need-based aid from Yale.



Military Options

- **GI Bill:** Education benefit for service members and veterans, it includes payment of tuition and fee, a monthly housing allowance and a stipend for textbooks and supplies.
- **Active duty members enrolled in college:** Members can enroll in traditional courses or online courses and pay for their education through active duty or combat pay.
- **Graduate Program Scholarships:** Navy Health Professions Scholarship Program, Army Health Professions Scholarship Program
- **Hazlewood Act:** State of Texas benefit that provides qualified Veterans, spouses, and dependent children with an education benefit of up to 150 hours of tuition exemption, including most fee charges, at public institutions of higher education in Texas.
